BOARD REPORT

It's the Holiday Season! A time for good cheer and for visiting family and friends. The LOE Board members are beginning this season with a new team and a full agenda for the New Year. First, a recap from last month:

Actions taken by the Board:

1. The Board approved the updated language related to community inspections of residents' properties. The updated language applies to page 25, item #3, of the Homeowner's Rules: Procedures for Handling Violations. An addendum will be added and disseminated to residents.
2. The Board approved the language re: the cutting back of tree limbs on common grounds. The budget and the monthly dues increase were approved.
3. For budget planning purposes, the Board instructed Associa to obtain bids for the replacement of the clubhouse roof.
4. A report is being prepared on the Stormwater Management System Annual Inspection that was conducted by our Common Grounds/Ponds Committee. This report will be provided to the Board and submitted to Evesham Township.
5. At the Board's direction, Associa is withholding final payment to Pinnacle until they address the surface of the tennis courts to the Board's satisfaction.
6. The Board approved a contract with Southwest Greens Bocce Courts to resurface the existing bocce courts completely, which will greatly improve the quality of play for residents.
7. At the annual open Board meeting, the Board presented next year's proposed budget and the needed increase in the monthly dues to \$160. The budget and monthly dues increase was approved.
8. The Board approved holding a "cornhole" league in the clubhouse during the winter months. More info to come.

Important Updates:

1. The much-needed power washing has been completed on the entrance walls, signage, pillars, Lowell Drive curb line, the mailbox and transformer by the clubhouse, the gazebo and walkway, and the clubhouse.
2. The Election Committee tallied the ballots for the November vote, and the LOE Board for the upcoming year is as follows:

TREASURER'S REPORT

As of October 2021, the LOE Association had \$32,266 in our operating accounts and \$377,549 in our reserve accounts. These balances show changes from the September operating account balance of \$30,655 due to a positive monthly expense variance. The Reserve funds increased because of our monthly allocation to our reserve cash balance.


The graph below shows a positive variance for the month of October in the amount of \$2,005 and a year-to-date negative variance of (\$37,402).

COMMON GROUNDS/PONDS

General Information:

As of this writing, the Common Grounds/Ponds Committee plans to hold its last 2021 meeting on December 15. We hope to recognize and welcome new members, elect a new chair, and look at projects for 2022. Thanks to the effort by many committee members in keeping our community stellar, we do not anticipate any significant challenges this year. However, there are several issues we need to address that should have a positive impact on our community. We plan to discuss and vote on them during our December meeting. They include discussions on how to support residents' concerns regarding common grounds and wetland infringement on their properties and the potential impact on our grounds from the explosive increase of apartments and condos around Legacy Oaks.

Pond Fountains Update:

All pond fountains were removed by Princeton Hydro (PH) on November 18 for inspection and winterization. They will be reinstalled during the early spring. With the acquisition of new/modern systems, our need for PH maintenance service has been minimal in 2021. We hope that—with the attention given by our pond volunteers and PH's continued excellent support—2022 will be as maintenance-free as 2021 was.

Tree Update:



With the recommendation of the arborist, our largest oak tree (located on the corner of Lowell drive at our clubhouse) was trimmed recently. The tree had grown so large that many branches had covered the clubhouse roof.

A beautiful blue spruce was also planted next to the pool in the open spot between the arborvitae

bushes.

Spotted Lanternfly Update:

We noticed that many homeowners placed sticky tape around their trees during the end of the summer and early fall. We applaud the concern and effort by our residents to manage these pests. However, we must point out that sticky tape is designed to capture nymphs and not the mature flies. Nymphs occur between April and August each year. They suck the tree sap, and capturing them with sticky tape is one of the best defenses. Spraying is another option.

We recommend that either one or both options be applied from April through August this year.

The common grounds maple and willow trees were not sprayed in 2021. We plan to apply sticky tape in the spring to the seven trees that were showing signs of spotted lanternflies.

Please chip in and help keep Legacy Oaks litter-free by picking up any litter you see when walking our beautiful development.

Our committee wishes everyone a very happy and prosperous 2022.



In the fall of 1918, thirteen-year-old German immigrant Pia Lange longs to be far from Philadelphia's overcrowded slums and the anti-immigrant sentiment that compelled her father to enlist in the U.S. Army. But as her city celebrates the end of war, an even more urgent threat arrives:

the Spanish flu. Funeral crepe and quarantine signs appear on doors as victims drop dead in the streets and desperate survivors wear white masks to ward off illness. When food runs out in the cramped tenement she calls home, Pia must venture alone into the quarantined city in search of supplies, leaving her baby brothers behind.

Bernice Groves has become lost in grief and bitterness since her baby died from the Spanish flu. Watching Pia leave her brothers alone, Bernice makes a shocking, life-altering decision. It becomes her sinister mission to tear families apart when they're at their most vulnerable, planning to transform the city's orphans and immigrant children into what she feels are "true Americans."

Waking in a makeshift hospital days after collapsing in the street, Pia is frantic to return home. Instead, she is taken to St. Vincent's Orphan Asylum – the first step in a long and arduous journey. As Bernice plots to keep the truth hidden at any cost in the months and years that follow, Pia must confront her own shame and fear, risking everything to see justice – and love – triumph at last. Powerful, harrowing, and ultimately exultant, *The Orphan Collector* is a story of love, resilience, and the lengths to which we will go to protect those who need us most.

Sudoku requires no calculation or arithmetic skills. It is essentially a game of placing numbers in squares, using very simple rules of logic and deduction.

The objective of the game is to fill all the blank squares in a game with the correct numbers. There are three very simple constraints to follow. In a 9 by 9 square Sudoku game:


- Every row of 9 numbers must include all digits 1 through 9 in any order
- Every column of 9 numbers must include all digits 1 through 9 in any order
- Every 3 by 3 subsection of the 9 by 9 square must include all digits 1 through 9

Every Sudoku game begins with a number of squares already filled in, and the difficulty of each game is largely a function of how many squares are filled in. The more squares that are known, the easier it is to figure out which numbers go in the open squares. As you fill in squares correctly, options for the remaining squares are narrowed and it becomes easier to fill them in.
